Celebrate October Half Term at the Official Residences of Her Majesty The Queen

This October Half Term, travel back to the time of medieval knights at Windsor Castle, hear spooky tales of witchcraft and magic at the Palace of Holyroodhouse, and find hidden details in paintings by some of the world's most famous artists at The Queen's Gallery, Buckingham Palace.

Windsor Castle



Knight Time 23, 25, 28–30 October, 10:00–15:00

Families visiting Windsor Castle this Half Term will learn all the skills they need to become a medieval knight for the day with interactive storytelling sessions in the Castle's magnificent State Apartments. After marvelling at the impressive suits of armour on display at the Castle – including a suit worn by Henry VIII that was expandable to accommodate his ever-increasing size – children can head to the Learning Centre and design their own shields to take home.

The Queen's Gallery, Buckingham Palace

Masterpieces from Buckingham Palace Half Term Activities 23–25 and 28–31 October, 10:30–17:00

What better way to introduce children to the joys of looking at art than by exploring the Masterpieces from Buckingham Palace exhibition at The Queen's Gallery? While discovering some of the finest paintings in the Royal Collection, including works by Rubens, Titian, Rembrandt, Vermeer, Van Dyck and Canaletto, families with young children can play an interactive 'Spot the Dog' game, looking closely at the artworks to match the dogs in the paintings with the dogs on their cards. Meanwhile, a spooky activity trail will



lead older children through some of the more eerie and unusual elements in these world-famous paintings, and families of all ages will love creating their own masterpieces with colouring sheets inspired by the paintings on display.

Palace of Holyroodhouse

Family Activity Day: Witches, Healers and Kings

Saturday, 23 October, 10:00–15:00. Holyrood Herb sessions will also run every Thursday, Friday and Saturday until 30 October 2021, 11:00–14:00.

More than 400 years ago, a local 'wise woman' named Agnes Sampson was accused of witchcraft and brought to the Palace of Holyroodhouse for questioning by the King himself. In this day of fun dropin activities and short talks, families visiting the Palace can find out what happened to Agnes, learn more about James VI's interest in witches and have a go at creating their own magic spell, just like the three witches in Macbeth.



In 'Holyrood Herb' sessions in the Palace's recently opened botanical garden, children will learn how people used plants and herbs throughout history in an attempt to prevent the spread of infection and disease through 'bad air', and can even make their own sweet-smelling bag of herbs to take home.

Notes to Editors
